East and West Germany had different flags from 1959-1990 because the two were split between the Democratic Allies and the Communist Soviet Union after World War II. A seven-striped rainbow flag design is used in Peru, Bolivia and Ecuador as a symbol of native ethnic groups and culture, and is anachronistically associated with the Tawantin Suyu, or Inca territory.
