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## Shows like my hero academia

D.Gray-Man is an overlooked shonen gem worth watching for fans of My Hero Academia. Released from 2006 to 2007, it's a dark and brutal "monster hunter" anime set in the late Victorian era. The anime Noragami, My Hero Academia, Blood Blockage Battlefront, Fire Force, Dead Mount Death Play, and other series follow ordinary Japanese teens thrust into violent yet fascinating worlds, often with a cheerful tone. Yato, a minor god, teams up with humans to gain fame and recognition in the human world and the Far Shore alike. In New York City, life goes on despite demonic threats, while Leonardo is given extraordinary power to help people. Fire Force's world turned into a reality where ordinary humans are monsters, and the Special Fire Force fights to protect citizens. One anime series that MHA fans will appreciate is Tokyo Ghoul, which features scenes of supernatural powers and unique animation. The story revolves around Ken Kaneki, who becomes a half-ghoul after being attacked by one and has ghoul organs implanted into him. This is similar to Izuku Midoriya's One For All moment but with a darker twist. Like other popular anime series such as My Hero Academia, Chainsaw Man, and Jujutsu Kaisen, Tokyo Ghoul explores the themes of identity and acceptance in a world where supernatural creatures exist. The series follows Ken as he navigates his new life as a half-ghoul, struggling with his hunger for human flesh while fighting against hostile ghouls and CCG investigators. Another anime that may appeal to MHA fans is Fairy Tail, which shares similarities with My Hero Academia in terms of its colorful and fun tone. The series follows the adventures of Lucy Heartfilia and Natsu Dragneel as they join the Fairy Tail guild and battle various foes. With its ensemble cast of lovable characters and magical effects, Fairy Tail offers a similar viewing experience to My Hero Academia. Additionally, fans of MHA may also enjoy One-Punch Man, which tells the story of Saitama, a bald superhero who can defeat his enemies with just one punch. The series offers a unique blend of humor and action, as Saitama's boredom and indifference make for an entertaining viewing experience. "My Hero Academia" enthusiasts will love these similar anime series that showcase superpowered heroes through a positive lens. One such show is "Fire Force," where firefighters with pyrokinetic abilities battle supernatural creatures known as infernals. Shinra Kusakabe, the main character, can generate flames from his feet and fights to prove himself as a hero despite being labeled a devil due to a past tragedy. Like Izuku Midoriya from "My Hero Academia," Kusabek is an underdog with a strong sense of purpose and determination. Another anime that resonates with "My Hero Academia" fans is "Haikyuu!", a sports anime about volleyball. Shōyō Hinata, the protagonist, refuses to let his short stature hold him back from achieving his dreams of becoming an amazing volleyball player. His passion and dedication inspire others, much like Midoriya's unyielding spirit in "My Hero Academia". While "Haikyuu!" has lower stakes than "My Hero Academia", it still demands emotional investment and features lovable characters that are hard to resist. For those who crave epic battles between heroes and villains, "Fire Force" delivers with its action-packed sequences and intense confrontations. The anime also explores themes of teamwork and friendship, which are central to the "My Hero Academia" series. Tanjiro Kamado from "Demon Slayer: Kimetsu no Yaiba", another anime on this list, shares similarities with Midoriya as a kind-hearted and determined hero who fights against supernatural forces after losing his family. Demon slayers Tanjiro and Yuji find common ground among their respective battles against demons, exemplified by their unwavering dedication to protect others. Like Midoriya, Tanjiro seeks to stop at nothing to achieve his goals and save as many people as possible. Yuji Itadori swallows a cursed finger to protect his friends, becoming possessed by a powerful demon. Tanjiro embarks on a journey with other young demon hunters who share similar personalities and traits, forming close bonds along the way. School is where Rin's power grows and friendships blossom in "Blue Exorcist". Fans of "My Hero Academia" will love this show for its focus on a group of students, each growing as exorcists. Unlike just following Rin, the series explores the entire cast's progress, their adventures building strength. Both Asta from "Black Clover" and Midoriya share huge ambitions despite lacking powers in a world where everyone has special abilities. In the Clover Kingdom, almost everyone derives magical powers from mana - except for Asta. Undeterred, he trains to achieve his dream of becoming Wizard King, even facing off against friend Yuno. The bond between Asta and Yuno mirrors that of Midoriya and Katsuki Bakugo. Both grew up together, now fighting for the top spot. "Black Clover" is perfect for "My Hero Academia" fans, as their dreams run parallel. Swap superheroes for a fantasy world with magic, similarities become clear. In contrast, "Full Metal Alchemist: Brotherhood" focuses on brotherhood and friendship amidst impending doom. Edward and Alphonse Elric are brothers whose worlds are torn apart - literally and figuratively - by alchemy. They use these powers to fight evil, gaining access to the Philosopher's Stone. As each conflict arises, Edward, Alphonse, and their allies grow as people, experiencing war's horrors. Like Midoriya and his classmates, they face scenarios well beyond their maturity levels. Edward and Midoriya share similar traits - never losing resolve despite the impossible. They overcome obstacles using self-confidence, putting lives on the line whenever necessary. Unlike "Haikyuu!" which doesn't involve superpowers or special schools, "Keep Your Hands Off Eizouken!" is a slice-of-life anime about three friends creating their own manga, dreaming of becoming successful artists. Midori Asakusa daydreams about amazing worlds every day, while friend Sayaka Kanamori sees her passion. With new student Tsubame Mizusaki's help, the girls embark on a journey to create their work. What makes this similar to "My Hero Academia" is the love and friendship between the trio of young girls trying to make their dreams come true. Each character has a distinct personality; everyone must learn to work together to achieve goals. It's not always easy, but "Keep Your Hands Off Eizouken!" is full of positivity, supported by beautiful artwork that makes a simple anime about three high school students feel as epic as any action anime. In "Assassination Classroom", it isn't the students who are extraordinary - the teachers are! A bizarre extraterrestrial octopus with a comical expression crash-lands on Earth and decides to instruct a group of ordinary students in the art of assassination. Unlike Midoriya and Bakugo from "My Hero Academia," these pupils are not endowed with extraordinary abilities, but they still learn innovative combat techniques. The instructor is an empathetic figure, unlike typical anime villains, which aligns with the complex motivations exhibited by some antagonists on "My Hero Academia." Both series delve into the gray areas between heroes and villains, showcasing that justice isn't always black-and-white. In a similar vein, "Hunter x Hunter" follows Gon Freecss as he strives to become a Hunter, a prestigious title granted after completing rigorous testing. This world of Hunters is filled with mystery, adventure, and self-discovery, as Gon assembles a group of friends who share his aspirations. The supporting cast in "Hunter x Hunter" boasts complex backstories and personal motivations, much like the characters on "My Hero Academia". By exploring each character's history, the series fosters emotional investment in their triumphs and failures. In contrast to the world of heroes depicted on "My Hero Academia," "Tiger & Bunny" presents a reality where superheroes compete for financial gain on a reality TV show called "Hero TV." In this world, aging hero Wild Tiger teams up with newcomer Barnaby, forming the first superhero duo. Their partnership is marked by clashing personalities and rivalries, but their victories are all the more satisfying due to their tumultuous relationship. Finally, in "Charlotte," powers are not uncommon, but they're also not overly abundant. The series follows Yuu Otosaka as he struggles to control his powers and maintain a normal life, highlighting the complexities of being gifted with extraordinary abilities. Discover how to hide and control abilities with maximum efficiency. This concept is intriguingly reversed in "Charlotte", where powers are portrayed as a burden rather than a blessing. Yuu is a contrasting figure to Midoriya, yearning for normalcy instead of striving for greatness. At the Death Meister Academy, students learn in pairs, with one being an expert and the other a human-weapon hybrid capable of shape-shifting. The objective? Transform the demon weapon into a "death scythe" by collecting the souls of 99 evil humans and one witch, thus achieving ultimate power. Unlike "Soul Eater"'s horror elements, Death Meister Academy and UA High School share similar settings. Students engage in combat while also attending classes with eccentric instructors. The show isn't just about action; education plays a significant role in the hero or death meister training process. Like "My Hero Academia", "Soul Eater" focuses on connections between multiple student groups as they strive to save the world. Interestingly, both shows share visual similarities due to being animated by the same company, featuring unique character designs that captivate attention.
